Walking Group

Friday, 17 August was a cooler summer day and excellent weather for Mike Bullows' five mile walk from Tugby. A group of sixteen members crossed the peaceful, quiet countryside where harvesting was well under way and almost completed, with tractors and drays carting huge

quantities of straw to storage. In recent hot weather, although there were sheep in some fields most fields were devoid of cattle, but today in one field the grass had become lush and green and provided welcome out of doors activity for a herd of cattle, which we negotiated with care. We took a water stop at the rural church in Goadby and then on to Rolleston Lake (escorted in one field by pheasants) and thence to the Fox and Hounds in Tugby for lunch. At lunch, we were joined by two other members and a good time was had by all.

The sun was shining yet again on 31 August for Linda Bickley and Su Coward's further-afield, 6 mile walk from King's Cliffe to Fineshade and onto Blatherwycke before returning to our starting point at the pub. The route took us along the tracks of Westhay Wood and the Jurassic Way to Top Lodge, across fields past Fineshade Abbey and onto the village of Blatherwycke. There we continued over the bridge, an idyllic scene including a pair of black swans, and along the side of Blatherwycke Lake and the game pens to Alders Farm. After a bit of a rest and some of our members scrumping some apples, we followed the course of the Willow Brook back to King's Cliffe where more members feasted on wild blackberries which were in abundance in the

hedgerows. Note to selves, next time bring plastic bags so the apples and blackberries can be made into a pie or crumble ! Other members had joined us earlier at the pub but took themselves off for a short DIY walk around Fineshades, taking their own time and doing their own thing but meeting us back at the pub to eat together. Best of both worlds.

Two groups of walkers set off from the King's Head, Smeeton Westerby, on 7 September. Nine members were led by Malcolm-Lever Jones for a five and a half mile walk across the fields back to Kibworth, turning left over more fields which, despite the rain of the previous evening, were rock hard. Crossing the Fleckney Road, down the jitty road and over a stile to the footpath on our left, we entered the Woodland Trust and British Waterways' woods making our way to the canal (avoiding two men with rather large lawnmowers cutting the grass on the canal banks). Crossing the Saddington Tunnel, we met up with the other group of seven, led by David Porter on a three mile walk, who had reached the same point by walking up Mill Lane, across the fields to the canal-side. Here, we all partook of Bucks Fizz and homemade cakes to celebrate the birthdays of three members of our group. Famous people also born on 7 September include Queen Elizabeth 1, Edwin Couotts and Buddy Holly! Suitably refreshed, we made our way back to the pub for a superb lunch, as always.

On this same date, Ian Coward led seven members on an extra-mile walk from the Square in Kibworth to Fleckney, stopping for a welcome refreshment break at the Toast Office cafe. Continuing east towards Arnesby, we then headed south to Shearsby to join the Leicestershire Round. There we ate our packed lunches in the church grounds before following the Round to Saddington and the reservoir, returning via Smeeton Westerby to Kibworth, a total of 11 miles.

Last Month's Speakers

Ros Ousey's "A Good Life" painted a vivid picture of how five families, each consisting of husband, wife and two children, bought land in Mowsley in 1975 to pursue a self-sufficient existence. Sheep, chickens and then bees were the chief livestock; part of the property was turned into an orchard.

They produced candles and polish from beeswax and eggs were used to make meringues. By 1984, there were just two families left.

Mary Franks' talk entitled "Genealogy" showed how family history studies have been transformed by the internet. Her researches into her own ancestors (some of whom lived in Weir Road in the 18th century) have revealed how hard lives were then. The importance of tracing distant cousins and realising the importance of family anecdotes have proved lasting lessons.

In "A Dramatic Life", **Helen Ingall** recounted her experiences of the theatre. Elocution lessons (clearly necessary - she was born in Nottingham) led to acting exams and the role of Dorinda in "The Beaux' Stratagem". She moved to Oxfordshire and then, in 1970, to Oadby, furthering her dramatic career. She now takes part in murder mysteries and

delights in appearing as Tess Tickle, Fran Tick or Mellow Drama.
